Many linguists say the best way to learn a language is to live in a place where the language is spoken. But for people like Fidler, who is married with two children, that's not so easy. Instead, he and classmates find time from their busy schedules to practice with each other and their Brazilian colleagues. They also immerse themselves in Brazilian culture by watching Brazilian TV shows and films, and reading Brazilian newspapers and maga-

The school aims for students to achieve conversational fluency. Unlike other programs that stress memorization or use mnemonic methods, inlingua avoids rote memorization and encourages students to experiment. The teacher acts as a guide, leading discussions and activities.

ROLE PLAYING

Some time is designated for practicing real-life scenarios in the target language, including business expressions and terms.

Such exercises have proven beneficial to Fidler, who can now e-mail his colleagues in Sao Paolo in limited Portuguese as well as use industry-related terms, such as alvura, to refer to the brightness of paper.

"My colleagues say they see an improvement in my Portuguese. I can at least speak a little with them and perhaps speak much more when I travel there," Fidler
